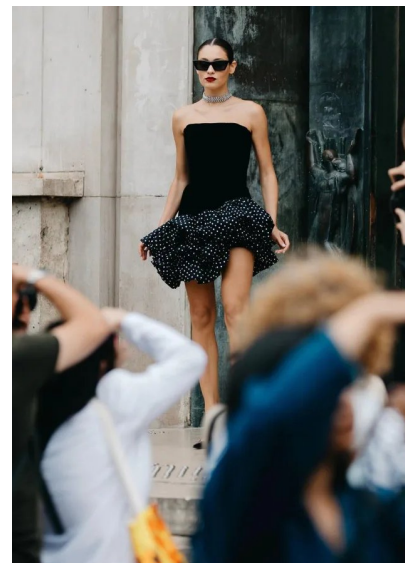

The Best Street Style From Haute Couture Fashion Week In Paris

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Descending on Paris twice a year (in January and July), Haute Couture Fashion Week is known for its theatrics and presentation. Designers bring their most creative pieces, and the spectacle is a thing to behold. Haute couture, translated literally as “high dressmaking,” describes “garments created as one-off pieces for a specific client.” But it isn’t just a category of apparel. “Haute couture” is also an exclusive designation given to a handful of fashion houses that follow strict rules set forth by the French fashion industry’s governing body (the *Chambre Syndicale de la Haute Couture*).

To the average person, haute couture might seem strange and unrelatable. The pieces may not appear as wearable as your typical evening gown, and can range in cost from \$25,000 to \$80,000 per piece – even more if it’s bridal. But there’s a reason these collections are different from the typical ready-to-wear variety. Haute couture is as much art as it is fashion, and art necessarily pushes boundaries and challenges paradigms. The paradigm challenged here seems to be: “things normal people wear.” (Consider it challenged.) If you’re going to pay \$30,000 for a single outfit, it had better stand out.

But it wasn’t just the couture that stood out last week. As expected, the streets during Haute Couture Week were almost as theatrical as the runways – although slightly more relatable. All casts of characters were seen challenging themselves stylistically and experimenting with unconventional silhouettes and surprising combinations.
